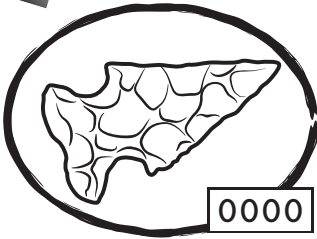

## **CLUES for your hike!**

1. After turning on Skiway Avenue, take the first left before the bridge into the parking area.
2. Carefully cross the road to the paved path to the right of the playground across the road.
3. Playgrounds are located on each side of the road.
4. Follow the road straight and at the playground turn right on the paved path (the playground will now be on your left).
5. At the fork on the path, stay left (don't cross the bridge). The playground will continue to be on the left, and a creek will be on the right.
6. Follow the trail to a small pavilion and turn left on the park road.
7. The post will be located on a tree to the right of the road near the picnic tables.
8. Continue on the path following the road back to the parking area.

## **Did You Know?**

An arrowhead is the sharp, pointed tip of an arrow, but not all pointy stones are arrowheads.

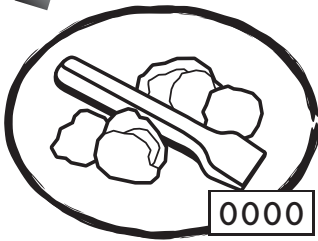

## **CLUES for your hike!**

1. Use the park entrance by the splash pad and park near the back corner of the parking area.
2. Start near the large wooden structure with a sign that says "Cumberland Valley Rail Trail" where there is a yellow "No Bare Heads" sign and yellow textured walk on the ground.
3. Take the path to your left toward Shippensburg University.
4. Follow the path straight over the bridge.
5. Carefully cross the parking area entrance and follow the path.
6. Go under the bridge and continue following the path.
7. Follow the path all the way until you see metal poles in the path with a gate and green sign that says "N Prince St." The post can be found there.
8. Turn around on the trail and completely retrace your steps all the way back to the wooden sign structure.
9. Continue going straight on the path until you reach the sign area where you entered.
10. Turn right and cross the yellow textured painting area on the ground.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Starting in the parking area at Jerome King Park, in front of the tennis courts, walk through the green chain-link fence access point, where a green ash tree will be directly ahead.
2. Turn left toward the playground, passing three benches on the right and a glider swing, with the Barkdoll baseball field straight ahead.
3. Bear left between the pavilion and the baseball field to access the paved trail and continue until the fence line begins, after passing the bathrooms on your left.
4. Follow the fence line along the outside edge of the baseball field, walking toward the pickleball courts. When you reach the courts, turn left, then right, then right, to walk around the pickleball courts. Turn left back onto the paved path, outside the baseball field.
5. Rejoin the paved trail that runs along the baseball field, passing the bleachers and dugout, while staying along the fence line to the edge of the park.
6. Continue following the trail, passing the tennis courts on your right and turn right on the path when you reach E. Walter Ave.
7. The post will be located on the last tree on the right.
8. Turn right and walk around the edge of the park, along Walter St., toward Carlisle St. and continue around the small softball field back to the parking area.

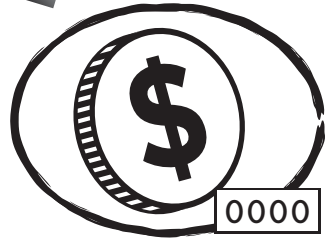

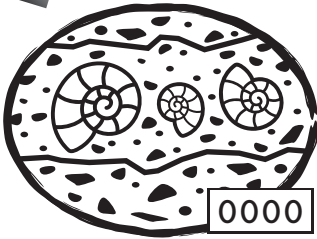

## CLUES for your hike!

1. From the parking area, walk toward the bridge for about ten yards and look for the entrance to the trail on your left. The trail goes into the woods, down some rock steps.
2. Start following the yellow markers on the trees. Notice all the beautiful pine trees.
3. Continue following the yellow marked path, eventually coming to a large lake on the right.
4. From the lake, make a small left turn and cross over the wooden bridge.
5. Continue following the yellow marked trail, which will go over rocks, over more rocks, and over more rocks.
6. Keep walking over the rocks, following the yellow marked trail; it's not much farther.
7. As you walk down a slight hill on the path, the post will be found near a tree.
8. To return to your vehicle, retrace your steps to the parking area.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Start at the swing set and look toward the wooded side of the playground.
2. Walk between the big gray boulders at the head of the trail and past the tall grass until the trail splits.
3. Take the middle Woodland Trail into the woods.
4. Continue to follow the wooded trail, down the hill and cross over the bridge on the left.
5. Turn left after stepping off the bridge.
6. Follow the trail with the stream to your left.
7. The post will be on the second bridge you cross.
8. To return to your vehicle, climb up the hill to the right and make your way to seven steps.
9. Turn left at the top of the seventh step and into the field of high grass.
10. Follow the grass line to the right.
11. Walk back out of the trail between the two big gray boulders, and back to the parking area.

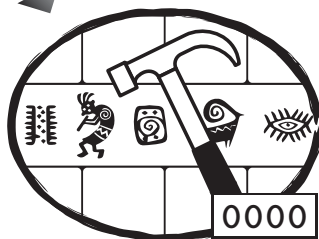

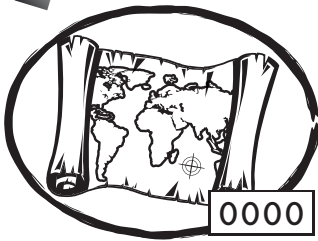

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Park in the parking area at the Park Office.
2. From the parking area, head toward the road and carefully turn left on the road.
3. Immediately after crossing the bridge, a sign for Midland Trail will be to your left. Turn left onto the trail going into the woods.
4. Follow the gravel trail, which is marked with yellow blazes along the path.
5. Cross the small bridge that crosses over the creek.
6. At the end of the gravel path, turn left onto the paved path continuing to follow the yellow blazes.
7. Cross the small bridge and then the larger bridge that follows the small bridge.
8. After the large bridge, go down the stairs or ramp and stay left on the paved path.
9. At the end of the paved path, turn right onto the gravel path.
10. The pool area will be to your right.
11. The post will be located on a tree to the left of the gravel trail past the pool area.
12. Continue on the trail, keeping the creek to your right.
13. At the brown A-T North sign, turn right and cross the bridge.
14. At the fork in the path after the bridge, keep right.
15. At the Y in the path, keep right.
16. Turn right onto the dirt/grassy area with lots of picnic tables (this is not a trail).
17. Continue straight through this area (the road will be to your left, and the creek and the pool area will be to your right).
18. At the parking area, after passing the pool area, turn right to go over the bridge.
19. After the bridge, take the first left into the woods and back onto Midland Trail.
20. Follow the trail to the road.
21. Turn right onto the road and carefully walk back to the parking area.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Begin your hike with the path at the corner of the lower parking area that runs between the pavilion and playground with a climbing dome.
2. At the Y in the path, keep left and follow the gravel path with a fence on the right.
3. At the end of the gravel path, continue on the grass to a second gravel path, then turn left.
4. Follow the gravel path to the T in the path and turn right. The path turns into a paved path.
5. Continue to the parking area, then carefully cross it to the opposite corner, keeping the fenced sports areas on your left.
6. Continue on the trail at the “No Motor Vehicles” sign. You will see a large birdhouse straight ahead.
7. Keep left at the Y intersection and continue on the paved path as it loops around the park.
8. At the Y in the path keep to the left (the birdhouse will be on the right, and the sports areas will be on the left). Continue on the paved path until you reach the row of houses.
9. Before the row of houses, turn right. Houses will now be on the left and a soccer field to the right. Keep right at the next Y and continue on the paved path.
10. Turn left at the T, then go straight at the next intersection and cross over the bridge.
11. After the bridge, keep left with a dog park on the left and railroad tracks on the right.
12. At the next T in the path, turn right and continue past the “Miner” train station on the right. Head across the railroad tracks.
13. Keep left at the Y in the path after the railroad tracks, then turn right to cross the wooden bridge. The red train will be on your left.
14. Look for the post on a tree to the right of the path near the volleyball area. To return to your vehicle, follow the path toward the pickleball courts back to the original parking area.

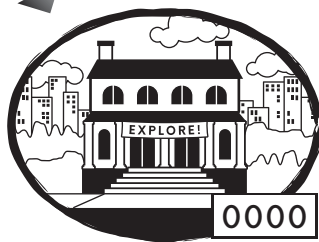

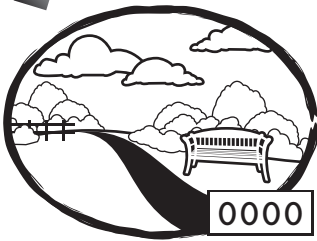

## **CLUES for your hike!**

4. Walk around the edge of the basketball court next to the brown building where the bathrooms are. Step on the concrete pad in front of the brown building and walk toward the paved path passing the splash pad, which will be on your right and veer left on the path.
5. Continue on the path heading toward the parking area adjacent to the entrance. The post will be on the second tree on the left, after the bench. Continue to the parking area.

1. Start facing the Dykeman Spring Nature Park sign by the yellow hydrant.
2. Walk toward the pavilion, keeping the pavilion on the left as you begin to veer right toward the trail opening, passing the tree with the Jacob Michael Crider sign at its base on the left.
3. Start up the trail and go left at the first fork.
4. At the second fork, stay left.
5. Go right at the third fork and walk to the bench to find the post.
6. Turn around and go straight down the hill, follow the fence line back to the parking area.

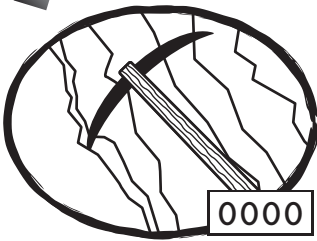

## CLUES for your hike!

1. If the gate is closed, you may still enter the park by parking along West Washington Street next to the sidewalk.
2. Walk around the boulders on the mulch or proceed through the gate and follow the gravel path toward the soccer fields, keeping the Conococheague Creek on your right.
3. Continue to the end of the parking area and cross the grassy section toward the cinder path, again following the stream on your right.
4. Stay on the path as it curves left; you will pass a bench on the right, then another bench with a plaque donated by the Chambersburg Lions Club.
5. Continue forward until you see an additional bench on your left. The post is on a tree beside that bench.
6. To return to your vehicle, follow the path until you reach a fork, then take the left path heading toward the nearby residential area.
7. At the end of the path, turn left to remain on the public walkway and follow it back toward the parking area.

4. Continue following the road uphill. You will eventually cross a parking area.
5. At the fork in the road turn left, keeping the skatepark to your right.

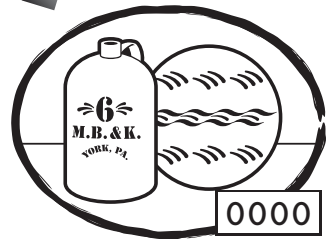

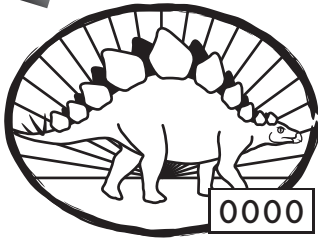

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Start at the back of the building with the bench by the goldfish pond on your left and walk toward the sign that says, "Main Trail." At the T junction, turn left.
2. Cross the road and continue straight down the dirt road. Turn left at the Groundhog Trail sign.
3. Keep the Groundhog Trail signs on your left and keep left, walking toward the pavilion.
4. Walk past the pavilion and the green shed on the left.
5. Stop and read about Bird Houses on the left and then continue following the path as it curves right.
6. Stay left at the fork and keep the stream on your left.
7. Continue straight passing the Charlies Trail sign on the left.
8. Turn right after the wooden amphitheater and follow the path, passing the Main Trail sign and the bench on your left.
9. Turn right, back on the Groundhog Trail and head back toward the pavilion.
10. Turn left in front of the pavilion and follow the path up a short hill. A wood pile is on the right.
11. The post is on the tree to the left before the gravel road.
12. To return to your vehicle, cross the road, turn left and follow the gravel road – watch for cars!
13. Follow the gravel road for several yards and turn right on the grass path, walking up a slight hill. You will pass a large, low shrub on your left.
14. Just past the River Birch sign on the right, follow the grass path to the left.
15. Continue back to the parking area.

## CLUES for your hike!

1. Start the trail at the bright yellow post beside the parking spaces – the stream is on the left.
2. Follow the trail to the left and pass the big piles of gravel on the right.
3. Pass the concrete pads and bench on the right – look down to find them.
4. Take the bend to the left and look for the Orange Pollinator Habitat Project sign on the right.
5. Walk to the wooden fencing – can you find the bluebird box? Hint – look at the fencing.
6. Look at the stream on your left as you continue walking.
7. Stop at the wooden fencing – can you find another bluebird box?
8. Follow the trail to the right and carefully cross the gravel road and pay attention to any gravel trucks driving back and forth.
9. As the trail bends to the left, follow the metal guard rail fencing.
10. Walk past the chain link fence on your right – do you see the solar panels on the right?
11. Keep following the trail in the same direction. Walk around the gravel circle and read the informational posts. The post is on the last informational post.
12. Retrace your steps back to your vehicle.

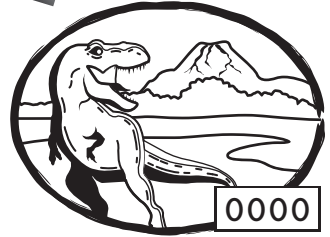

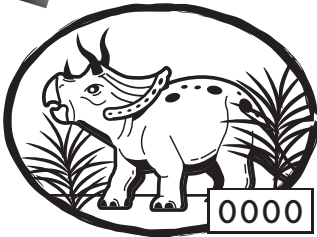

## **CLUES for your hike!**

1. Park near the park entrance and enter the paved path to the right of the entrance, with the basketball court behind you. The flagpole will be on your right as you enter the path.
2. The path will curve right with a fence on your left. Continue to follow the path as it curves around a baseball field and heads toward a large playground area.
3. Walk past the pavilion and a second parking area, heading toward a smaller playground on the right.
4. Just past the playground, stay straight on the path into the woods. The post will be ahead on your left.
5. Continue on the path in the same direction and stay right on the path toward the open field.
6. At the T, turn left and follow the path back to the parking area.
